This role is dear to my heart as it formed a big part of our little girl's life for her first four years.

I have over 25 years experience working in public health with high need communities, with about 15 of those in management roles and a further 7 1/2 years managing the business degree and graduate programmes at Wintec. I am also currently chair of the Cambridge Committee of Social Services.

I am passionate about making a difference, about standing up and speaking out, about being an advocate and giving a voice to those who sometimes feel they have none. I want to ensure every child who is in our fostering system gains the best possible experience and every family who take on fostering are well supported, acknowledged and equally have the best possible experience.
